I am learning more and more to love creation and its natural affirmation. I pray it will keep me fresh and help me avoid my own pervasive inattention in my ways and walking.

News from UU's for Social Justice of the Baltimore Washington Region

Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice (UUSJ) is on the move! Our recent Leadership Development Day was attended by over 180 people from sixteen congregations and organizations. UUSJ was created by UU congregations and agencies to address urban issues in our region as Unitarian Universalists. As many of you know, our focus is on Public Education for the next several years.

At our annual Leadership Development Day, held at All Souls Church in Washington DC, we were very fortunate to have Marian Wright Edelman, president of the Children's Defense Fund, give the keynote address.

The Rev. Rob Hardies, the new senior minister at All Souls Church opening the day with worship. Workshops were held with speakers on issues from public education to congregational social justice ministry. All Souls Church was bursting at the seams with enthusiastic participants.

Coming-of-Age

A small committee has been busy re-working the Coming of Age program. We have identified strengths of the current program, and have eliminated the weaknesses. We are evaluating comingof-age programs from other congregations and incorporating some of those elements. A major change will be to strengthen the role of the mentor and involving the parents more fully. It's been mentioned

before but bears repeating, the program will be offered for two years in a row to bring the age down from high school to 8^{th} – 9^{th} grade. We need to 12 cycle through a number of teens to accomplish this goal. Much thanks to those working on the committee: Beth Wood-Roig, Scott Michael, Darlene Rothwell, Ken Bourn, and Emily Deickman.

Note to all Child-care Providers

In an attempt to establish consistency of childcare responsibilities and rules, I will be holding after Sunday trainings for all childcare providers currently on our roster. They will be held on May 19th and May 26th directly after R.E. at 11:15. It should take about ½ hour. All sitters interested in remaining on our roster must attend one of the trainings.

Meet Dr Dorothy Lemmey

You might have noticed the small, feisty, blond woman standing at the podium. You can barely catch sight of her green eyes peering over the top. She will inform you, that despite the obvious, "I am standing."

A Unitarian Universalist since 1994, first at the East Shore UU Church (ESUUC) in Kirtland, Ohio, and then the UUFHC in 2001, Dorothy "intentionally shunned organized religion because of its judgmental attitude toward women and its support of the subjugation of women". The UU Principles inspired her and helped her to feel connected to the larger universe. Subsequently, she enthusiastically was a delegate to two General Assembly conferences while attending ESUUC.

Twelve years earlier in her life, Dorothy was prompted by the knowledge of her sister's violent abuse experiences at the hand of her sister's husband, she expanded her career of obstetric and gynecological nursing to include public awareness of the growing national domestic violence statistics. Her involvement spans 20 years. During that time she earned her Master of Science in Nursing and Doctoral degree in Nursing.

She spearheaded the Silent Witness Initiative with the life-sized red wooden figures on the ESUUC lawn in 1995. When Dorothy and her partner Ken Schmidt moved to Maryland and joined the UUFHC, she became Publicity Chairperson. With the sponsorship by Harford Community College and the Sexual Assault and Spousal-Abuse Center (SARC), Dorothy oversaw UUFHC's adoption of the Silent Witness Program in October, 2001. The purpose was to bring the horrible truth of domestic violence-related murders in Harford County in the last nine years to the awareness of passersby on Maryland Route 22. There were 10 figures, including a pregnant mother and her young child and one male figure. Harford Community College borrowed the figures for the month of March, 2002 for display in the Student Center lawn area.

Dorothy gives so much to everything she undertakes: Initiating mUUvies, a once a month movie-watching with discussion-following potluck-happening at her and Ken's home; stunningly dressed as a woman from the Susan B. Anthony era to enhance her testimony for why she is a UU, to lend support to the Stewardship Campaign; and participating in the newly-formed UUFHC Readers' Theatre group which performed at a recent Worship Service.

Her enthusiasm and energy level inspires other women and men to respond to many societal challenges. She served on a local Ohio Battered Women's Board, and was president of that board for over a year before moving to Maryland. As a result of passage of the Ohio legislation which demanded pro-arrest policies and assessment and intervention by health professionals, Dorothy was involved in training police and nurses in preparation for these cases.

In connection with her impression of the women's suffrage movement, she organized two trips from her Ohio church to the little-known Women's Rights National Historical Park in Seneca Falls, NY. A "must-see" for all women, men, and children for it marks the inspiring beginning of American women's struggle for equality.

On her list of interests and achievements, Dorothy attended the United Nations 4th World Conference on Women in Beijing, China in 1995. The Cleveland Plain Dealer published her summary report which she emailed from Beijing, and upon her return Dorothy spoke to over 18 organizations about the women's conference. Consequently, in her biography there are numerous published articles, television and radio interviews.

To our dismay, Dorothy and Ken will be moving back to Ohio, to further their careers and educational goals at Kent State University. One side benefit for Dorothy is that she will be closer to Dawn, her 30-year-old daughter who lives in a "wonderful residential facility". Dorothy travels once a month to see Dawn. About Dawn Dorothy said, "She has made me a better nurse, person and teacher. She never walked or talked but her eyes will let you know if she accepts you."

Hear Dorothy again: "My hope for UUFHC is to be a voice in the community of non-oppression, non-violence, equality, acceptance of all faiths, sexual preferences and ages. Therefore, the community will recognize us as 'Oh, that's the church that stands up amongst the crowd and shouts-LET'S ROLL'."

Dorothy Lemmey. This is just the beginning of her story.
