And I receive the news from polls in which I do not hear my voice. And I wonder—oh yes I wonder—if we are simply unable, as a species, to stretch our imagination beyond the drama of war. I wonder if we can ever possibly focus our resources on the drama of intimacy, healing and peace. For that is a greater challenge and an endeavor that would keep us eternally occupied, rather than prone to irrational fear, extraordinary greed and dangerous boredom from self patronage.

No, I did not partake of the quiz I witnessed on a news brief, beguiling its watchers to identify ships in the gulf. Anchor: "What is the name of this destroyer? . . . Stay tuned for your answer after this commercial break." As if we can rev up the denial to the point of games of multiple choice and truth or dare. No, I do not see inevitability in any human choice or action, simply arrogance and self serving promotion toward a vision of a world that does not embrace the people, let alone all living beings, of the world. And the "we can't turn back now" logic is faulty and shallow at best.

Do we have things to work out? Of course we do. Are there good leaders and bad leaders? No doubt. Are we living an equitable existence in terms of resource and finance? Not in the least. Does that give us the right to be first strike aggressors? Not in my dream of a worthy nation. Do we presume realities simply because we say so? Not in my hopes for a free and fair government. Since we have the privilege of more, does that mandate control of the rest? Not in my understanding of democracy. Is this how we honor the military who have put their lives on the line for peace and justice? Is this how we use the freedom they fought and died for? Their lives are worth



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more than that. Our lives are worth more than that. All lives are worth more than that.

We can find another way. Do not doubt it. Nothing in our lives is inevitable except our deaths. In-between our birth and death is a treasure of possibility and potential for change. Be your true selves. Do not let others tell you who you are. Make your own decisions and believe in your ability to thrive without destroying another's right to do the same. We can do this. Don't let yourself be underestimated. This is a plea to your beauty within. Let it shine with fierce and loving glory. This I pray.

UU Sound Bytes

Query: How can you be spiritual if you don't read from the Bible?

Response: We read from the Bible, now and again. - or - The Bible is a good book, but it's not the only book (a favorite line from Inherit the Wind).

Subtext: In UUism, revelation is not sealed. Truth emerges, breaks through or reveals itself in many ways. We honor wisdom from many sources. We know it is wisdom through our intuition; it "feels" right. We test what we've learned in community.

Query: What is your reference book, then? What is your religious text?

Response: We base the structure of our living faith through the wisdom of our principles and purposes. We use all sorts of texts for reference and guidance to understand the sacred in our lives.

Query: But how do you know what is right? How can you check the righteousness of your faith journey?

Response: That's the mystery of faith, isn't it? We know it is right when it is supported by the wisdom of our experiences, our study and our intuition.

We also know that no one is always right, nor is one text or community the keeper of all the answers. As the Hindu say: "God is One," but the wise speak of it in many ways.

Subtext: One of the hardest aspects to communicate about Unitarian Universalism is the fact that you cannot fulfill a formula that then qualifies membership. Unless you would call this a formula: the belief in the genius of creation or spark of divinity within all beings, the yearning to apply one's life to the beauty and wisdom inherent in our being, and the willingness to educate oneself in the discipline of diversity, finding the inherent worth and dignity of all. No one book spells this journey out for Unitarian Universalists.

Three teens had dropped out and wanted to participate next year, and that left a small handful of youth to continue on. The program was designed in part to be an independent study, and any work the youth have done to this point and beyond will be credited and encouraged. With the blow of the financial health of the Fellowship at the beginning of the year and all the attention it created, as well as the RE program trying to maintain three OWL programs and full length Children's Worship, we felt the RE energy and Fellowship focus was not in the place that the Coming of Age program deserves to make it successful. "The Vagina Monologues" comes to Bel Air

Thanks to UUFHC for providing rehearsal space to "V-Day Bel Air." What is V-Day? It's a global movement to stop violence against women and girls. Through V-Day campaigns, both Worldwide and College, local volunteers and college students produce annual benefit performances of "The Vagina Monologues" to raise awareness and funds for anti-violence groups within their own communities. V-Day campaigns strive to empower women to find their collective voices and demand an end to the epidemic levels of violence and abuse in their communities around the world.

V-Day Bel Air's beneficiary is SARC, the Sexual Assault, Spousal Abuse Resource Center. In FY 2002, SARC served 2,252 individuals. That's an average of over 6 individuals per day.

The cast includes members of UUFHC as well as women from the local community.

V-Day Bel Air will hold its benefit performance one night only, on Saturday, March 1, 2003 at 7:00 pm. The group is still looking for a venue. Ticket prices will be \$12 for adults and \$6 for students.

Member Profile: Meet Judi Walkley

A long time UUFHC member, Judi, (Judith) joined us when our church was located on Lee Way in Bel Air in 1984. She was the first person to greet me when I walked into our church at our present location. Always a smiling face, Judi is frequently seen greeting folks. Born in beautiful Cumberland, Maryland she began her formal education at Allegany Community College where she achieved her AA degree. Later, she met Paul Stehlik and they were married at the Towson UU church where they had the distinction of being the first couple to be married there. They moved to Harford County in 1976, "on 4 acres, stream, pool, and little 'fixup' house."

Ryan was born in 1977, and later Paul was given custody of his 2 children from his former marriage, Monica then 13 and Paul Jr. 10, whom she calls "P.J." As mother to Paul's two and their son Ryan, Judi's face smiles quietly recalling thoughts of those challenges.

In time, after the marriage ended, she returned to college and earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Business, with concentration in Information Systems. Working in Human Resources since 1987, Judi's career path took her through Administrative Assistant, Human Resources Information System Analyst and to her current position as Manager since 1993 at Sinai Hospital in Baltimore.

Judi sees herself as an introvert "until you get to know me." She is an avid reader of many genre, mostly fiction, such as historical novels and mysteries. A favorite author is Anne Tyler. Judi likes to dance to all kinds of music, likes listening to most music, and was part of Freedom Road Productions administrative staff for several years. Judi is versatile. Her hobbies include Yoga, and art pastels and ceramics, and making potpourri from dried herbs from her own small garden. In her elementary school years she won a poetry contest, and told stories she made up. She's also a member of an investment club, which piques her interest in the business world.

She always liked animals, including "Gypsy Rose" (horse), "Romeo and Juliet" (birds), ducks, and dogs (one was "Seconds"). The current animal-in-residence is "Bonnie the Cat".

Among her volunteer positions, she has been a part of "everything but Finance." t is with great pleasure that I can report to you that we will be keeping Reverend Lisa as a full time Minister through the remainder of the fiscal year (April 30, 2003). Once again this Fellowship has pulled together to get us past another hurdle and it is with great pride that I can associate myself with this community. I want to take a moment to extend my sincere appreciation to those members and friends who contributed one time gifts totaling over \$20,000. These gifts substantially improved our immediate cash position and took a tremendous amount of short term pressure away from the Finance Committee and the Board. I also want to make it a point to say thanks to all the folks who participated in the fundraising efforts so far. Your commitment, dedication, and effort have us ahead of the fundraising plan for the year. While there is still a key fundraiser, the Serendipity Auction, which needs to conclude successfully, the Operating Budget is on track for finishing the fiscal year in healthy shape.

Committee Chairs, your committees have budgets and a mission. While you are always encouraged to spend wisely, please don't let your committee work suffer. The funds you have in the budget are available. Please strive to accomplish your goals. Should you anticipate a jeopardy and need additional funds, please bring this to the attention to the Finance Committee. *Important!* It is also time for your committees to begin listing and prioritizing your spending needs and wants for the next fiscal year. May 1, 2003 - April 30, 2004. Please include this as a priority in your committee meetings as we will need that information soon for our goal budget.

The Finance Committee needs members! It is particularly important now that we are beginning to enter the budget building process. We are seeking people who do not think they know or do not feel comfortable with finances as well as those who do. We have already the people we need to do the actual financial tasks. Your responsibilities will be to simply attend meetings on the 2nd Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm and represent the UUFHC Membership with your thoughts on what our spending priorities should be. Please consider this. Increased participation will make the Finance Committee healthier, and a healthier Finance Committee can only be a benefit to the UUFHC.

Finally, I'd like to remind all Members that while the immediate pressure has abated, please don't take your eyes off your personal financial planning for the Annual Canvass in March. It took \$20,000 in one time gifts and some reductions in spending to make this fiscal year financially sound. We can't expect that to occur again. We

must make up the difference in pledging or risk further budget cutting. Please consider increasing your existing pledge by 10% or perhaps adding \$5 a week. We ask that you be as generous as your personal financial situation will allow.

Without their help, we could not have found a home for the 408 trees that were sold or donated—only 1 tree remained homeless. Our crew all deserve a pat on the back as we had 60 more trees than last year and 1 week less to sell them. By the 22nd day of sales, all were gone, except for our lone Charlie Brown tree.

We made selling trees simpler this year in hopes of attracting more volunteers. The new Cashier position worked well, especially during the crunch periods, providing better accountability of funds and inventory. We also collected customer demographics (i.e. new or repeat customers) this year to better plan for next.

More importantly, more than a few customers asked questions about the Fellowship while paying in the lobby. Some took literature from the racks—some may come back. Perhaps next year, this can be looked upon as an innovative growth opportunity—manning a hospitality table serving *hot* apple cider to customers or even a computer kiosk slide show about UUFHC and pictures of our activities.

For next year, we are already in the works of brainstorming other fund raising ideas (i.e. pictures with Santa, personalized ornaments) that will complement and enhance Christmas tree sales. Of course, this will require more planning and volunteers to make it a reality.

If you did not get the opportunity to volunteer this year, we hope to see you next year. Aside from having fun, getting to better know your fellow members, and receiving a spiffy gold Christmas tree volunteer pin, we can now give you \$9,205 other reasons to volunteer.

UUFHC to Remain Active in PNC

Harford County Permanent Nominating Caucus (PNC) is now in its 43rd year. The purpose of the Caucus is to provide an opportunity for the citizens of Harford County to recommend individuals to the Governor of the State of Maryland for appointments to the Harford County Board of Education and the Harford Community College Board of Trustees. Non-profit organizations in the county thereby decide who will set policies for the public schools and the community college by recommending candidates for these boards.

UUFHC participates by sending 4 delegates to the Caucus on two Thursday evenings:

1. April 3: Candidates' Forum, 6:30 to10:00 pm at Southampton Middle School. Attendance by delegates required. Delegates receive completed candidate questionnaires, and candidates are available to answer questions.

2. May 22: Voting Convention, 6:45 to 8:30 pm also at Southampton MS. Attendance by delegates required. Nominees selected for Board of Education and Board of Trustee positions. PNC Board vacancies are filled by election (if applicable). This year UUFHC member JoAnn Macdonald is running for election on the PNC Board so she cannot be a delegate. PNC Board officers are also elected at this meeting.

Two geographic regions are open for candidates on the School Board: Bel Air (Ms. Terry Troy, incumbent) and Aberdeen (Col. Eugene Chandler, incumbent). The incumbents may choose to run again. Two College Board seats, representing County Council districts, are open and the incumbents may choose to run: District C (Ms. Helen Tauber) and District E (Dr. Rosemary Bonsack).

Please contact JoAnn Macdonald to complete the application to be a delegate. The deadline is March 6. UUFHC is proud to be a part of this historic Caucus. Keep us a part of the vital public education process!

Meditation Corner

A story is told of a conflict that took place between two Indian Rajahs. The one defeated the other and took captive the son of his rival, and the day he was to return to his own palace he prepared to march into the city in triumph. There was a great procession of elephants, cavalry, infantry, and a long line of captives.

Among them was the young prince. He was told that he was to walk bare-footed and bare headed. He was indignant and said, "What! Go in like that! What will people think! Imagine the faces they will make!" The rajah said, "You haven't heard all yet. You shall carry a bowl of milk in your hand, and if you spill so much as a drop, you will lose your head at the close of the procession!" In a few minutes they brought the bowl of milk, and two guards walked with him, one on either side, and the procession started to move. On and on they went for perhaps a mile or more into the presence of the rajah. And the young prince walked along holding the bowl of milk. It seemed to him he would never finish without spilling some of it, but he completed the ordeal safely. Finally, he stood before the Rajah, "Well young prince, what kind of faces did the people make?" The prince looked up and said, "Your majesty, I did not see the faces of the people. I saw only my life which I held in my hands and I knew one false step would make me lose my life."

Like the young prince learned, if we keep our eyes on the milk we will not worry what people think about us. So often we worry about what others think of us and try to live up to their expectations and even standards. This only brings misery and defeat.
