## From the President

The time is quickly approaching for this year's Stewardship Drive to ask for pledge commitments to support next year's budget. There is an article in this newsletter providing details on dinner and activities planned for Saturday, February 16. What I am writing about is the main focus for this year's drive.

This year our focus is on being responsible employers. The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Harford County employs three professional administrators, our Minister, the Reverend Lisa Ward, our Director of Religious Education, April Fritts and our Administrative Assistant, Nancy Karwatka. All three work during the week between services to keep all the business of the Fellowship moving. They oversee and manage numerous activities that allow us to keep our doors open and provide Sunday Services, Religious Education and so much more.

In my position as President I have the pleasure of working with Rev. Lisa, April and Nancy on a regular basis and I can assure you they are a "dream team." They are all self motivated, highly capable, dedicated, and conscientious. The high quality of their service is recognized and greatly appreciated by the Board. The Board approved a Goal Budget for the Stewardship Drive that included some focus on staff compensation.

What everyone may not realize is that we still do not provide any health care for our full time minister and we hope to fund at least a portion of her health care costs next year. We also hope to increase our Administrative Assistant's hours by just a couple hours a week so she can keep up with the workload. This would bring her to half time status which would mean we would also add retirement to her compensation package. Finally, we also hope to be able to give all staff members a cost of living adjustment to their salaries. The increases we are hoping for are very modest and would still not take us all the way to where we would like to be but it would be a step in the right direction and the right thing to do as employers. There will be more information on this and other aspects of the Goal Budget in the days and weeks ahead and I hope to see everyone on the USS Steward Ship on February 16!

## **Corner on Finance**

While the start of our new Fiscal Year on May 1 fast approaching, the Executive Board recently approved a Goal Budget to be used for this year's Stewardship Drive. The budget is still just a goal right now because it's subject to change based on the amount of pledges received. Once the Stewardship Drive is complete, the Finance Committee and the Board will make adjustments and then submit it to the Fellowship for approval at the Annual Meeting in April.

The main theme of the budget this year is to act more responsibly as an employer. In my article last month, I discussed some of the details of our efforts to become a Fair Compensation Congregation, and specifically our efforts to add a health care benefit to our compensation package to Rev. Lisa. The Goal Budget includes a contribution towards that benefit, as well as modest cost of living adjustments for each of our employees. For our secretary (Nancy Karwatka), the budget includes a small additional salary increase and retirement benefits. In order to help handle the increased workload as our Fellowship continues to grow, we plan to increase Nancy's weekly hours from 18 to 20.

We are also working to be more discrete in discussing compensation for our employees. In the past, we've published salary figures in draft budgets that were widely distributed within the Fellowship. As the numbers change as a result of discussions with various committees and the level of pledges received, this undoubtedly caused some consternation as our employees watched their salaries fluctuate. This year, we plan to wait to publish the exact figures until the budget is submitted at the Annual Meeting. (Please feel free to contact me to discuss these figures privately or to raise any concerns with this approach.)

Compensating our employees is our biggest expenditure (about 60% of our budget), so these changes are the most significant. Other additional expenses next year will be the one-time cost of our ordination of Scott Sammler-Michael; an increase in the Religious Education budget to reflect the cost of providing training for OWL teachers; and small increases in what we pay for utilities, maintenance, and taxes.

Your pledges are what enable the Fellowship to function. While we make some money from fundraisers and rental income, over 70% of the Goal Budget is from pledges. Your generosity during the upcoming Stewardship Drive will allow us to become the congregation we aspire to be.

This YRUU group has decided to focus in on environmental issues, so expect more to come from them as we work towards a green sanctuary. ### We Raised the Banner!

The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Harford County increased the number of "socially active congregations" in the history of the Unitarian Universalist Association on Sunday, January 6. As a Welcoming Congregation, UUFHC's members voted unanimously in 2007 to raise a banner above the front door to the building showing to all passersby that they support proposed legislation in the Maryland General Assembly. The words on the banner say it all: "Civil Marriage is a Civil Right."

In a most impressive Banner Raising Ceremony, which began promptly at 1:00 pm under a beautiful sunny blue sky, UUFHC stepped out farther than ever before into the world of activism and joined thousands of other Unitarians and Universalists in witnessing for civil rights. The Unitarian and Universalist histories bear witness to the struggle for civil rights in America and in the world community over 200 years.

On this brisk day, Rev. Lisa G. Ward, Minister at the UUFHC, enthusiastically welcomed and inspired the attendees with her Opening Words. Those listening were affirmed in their decision to raise the banner for all to see. The banner reflects the views of UUFHC members in the public forum.

An aside: many Harford County residents are conservative in their political opinions and follow more traditional and narrow-focused interpretations of the Christian Bible than do the members of UUFHC. Therefore, the United States Constitution's First Amendment regarding separation of church and state is in question in Harford County, and that spirited discussion impacts the Maryland General Assembly on this particular issue. The Maryland legislature, in previous years, did recognize the civil rights of gay, lesbian and transgender persons in the areas of living quarters and employment. However, as in other parts of the country, these legalities came after much hard work. Outreach Director for the Maryland Black Families Alliance and member of the organization Equality Maryland, encouraged the attendees to join with her in the commitment to see the legislation, also referred to as "same-sex marriage," pass the legislature. She compared the centuries-old racial civil rights movement with the current gay rights movement in America. Her great speaking voice echoed, "We shall not be moved!" Ms. Gilmore meant that she would not be deterred in her commitment.

When Steve Buckingham, Vice Chair of the UU Legislative Ministry Board of Directors, spoke next he firmly countered with: "We **shall** be moved!" He very explicitly meant that the UU Legislative Ministry was equally committed to the passage of the legislation.

Rev. Ward so deftly coordinated both speakers' messages into the same message and became the moderator for a moment. She then introduced Doug Rose, a member of the PFLAG Bel Air/Susquehanna Chapter. Mr. Rose thanked UUFHC for its being a Welcoming Congregation, and for opening the doors to recognition of gays and lesbians in the larger Harford County community. He recounted his earlier years as a teen and having to hide his sexuality out of fear.

Members of UUFHC, Maureen Gerrity, Chair of LGBT Concerns Task Force and her family, Jan Gibson-Gerrity, her committed life partner and their two children, Kristina and Sasha, read "Two Hearts" which was adapted from the piece by Sherri Waas Shunfenthal. The attendees' applause was heartfelt for them, as much as it was for the other speakers.

Reflections came first from Joyce Kipp, President of PFLAG BelAir/Susquehanna Chapter, and "the mother of two sons, one straight and one gay." Mrs. Kipp is as dedicated to both of her sons and their well-being as any parent in attendance. She, along with other parents and speakers, reminded all present of the disparity in civil rights. PFLAG has been in the forefront of the argument for gay and lesbian civil rights.

As the second Reflection, Rev. Ward read a letter from Rev. Phyllis Hubbell, Minister of the First Unitarian Church of Baltimore. Her church has a large banner over its doorway, proclaiming to all passersby: "Civil Marriage is a Civil Right." In her letter Rev. Hubbell recounted a thank-you letter from a woman who was affirmed in her own sexuality by that public statement.

All through the ceremony the wind tried unsuccessfully to unveil the banner above the doorway. At the right moment

To further challenge the attendees, Ms. Lea Gilmore,

Rev. Ward seized on that point and Scott Morrison pulled back the cover. Everyone rose, clapped and cheered!

Together the attendees sang in a lively fashion the Spiritual, *"When the Spirit Says Do"* written by Mark Freundt. Rev. Ward closed with the Pastoral Prayer.

As one, the attendees picked up their chairs, went into the building, further affirming the banner's presence: "Civil Marriage is a Civil Right." We duly raised the banner.

# Spirit In Practice: A New Adult Ed Course at UUFHC Begins Sunday, February 24

UUFHC will again field test a new curriculum, part of the "Tapestry of Faith" series and entitled "Spirit in Practice." The authors state that "Spirit in Practice was created to help Unitarian Universalists develop regular disciplines, or practices . . . that help them connect with the sacred ground of their being, however they understand it."

Becca Motil and Rev. Lisa will co-facilitate this adult education class which will meet for two hours on alternating Sundays and Thursdays; approximately once every 10 days through June.

Goals of the course include:

- Nurture a deepening spiritual life and spiritual centeredness
- Consider the value of spiritual practice, in a variety of forms, as a means to deepen faith and enhance the quality of everyday living
- Cultivate individual and communal spiritual practices
- Develop participants' alertness to the wonder and mystery of existence
- Encourage experiences of the sacred through worship, ritual, wisdom of faith traditions, and spiritual disciplines
- Explore possibilities for deepening experiences of spirituality in the context of a UU Congregation.

The course will meet Sundays from 12:00 to 2:00 pm beginning February 24 and meeting approximately every third Sunday, and on Thursdays from 7:00 to 9:00 pm beginning March 6 and meeting approximately every third Thursday. 
